My high level definition: Learning Design and Technologies (LDT) is the application of old or new mediums (multimedia) as a vehicle to delivery deliberate, systematic information or processes (systematic design) that improves educational or professional development (performance improvement).

After thinking about how I would define LDT and then reading the assignments, I took for granted that technology has not been static. I did not consider the early 1900's as the start of media being used for instructional purposes (Reiser and Ely, 1997, pg 64).

And then as audio visual became more wide use in the 1970's definitions changed to make room for that technology. It seemed to me there were two items we are talking about. Learning Design, I considered as the framework of how information was going to be transferred, the process. The technology portion of LDT, is the platform, the way to broadcast that information. With the glut of technology we have in 2015, educators need to be mindful with what platform we present our information. Technologists should be mindful to not use a new technology just for the sake of using that new technology but use it because it is the best platform to delivery that information.
